# **Consulting Agreement Approved For Madrona Marsh Nature Improvements**

Torrance's Madrona Marsh will undergo nature improvements and is to be consulted by SAA Associates of Pasadena.

Members of the Torrance City Council approved the agreement in the amount of \$43,500 during Tuesday's meeting, in a unanimous 6-0 vote [Councilwoman Heidi Ann Ashcraft was absent].

SAA Associates, with more than 25 years of experience in planning, design, construction management and project management, was not the cheapest bid but registered the highest number in the evaluation score.

"Just wanted to point out that there was a Torrance company that actually came in cheaper," Councilman Tim Goodrich said. "Just wanted to point out that this council has granted concurrence in the past to have staff look at other opportunities to award Torrance businesses more business and I think this would have been an excellent opportunity to do so." preserve, as well as educating the community about the wide range of life that thrives in at the Marsh.

"The Preserve is situated within the greater El Segundo Sand Dune System," states the staff report signed by General Services Director Sheryl Ballew. Through the Nature Education Facilities Grant Program, under Proposition 84, the city was awarded the grant funds in 2011.

"Due to the available budget and current soil stability, the option to install a deck near the sump will not be pursued."

"This is actually not a new program; this was done a few years ago through the RAND Corporation," Senior Director of Secondary Education Dr. Nisha Dugal said. "They did the surveys and underage drinking was identified as one of the issues to address in the South Bay."

Approval by the board had to officially be requested for the students to in the drug prevention program, event though this is not the first time that the district's students have participated.

"For the last few years the program



He knew, and was well aware of the fact, that concrete and marble monuments with beautifully etched words of patriotism, sacrifice, and freedom are one thing, but our continued caring and commitment to those who have served (and their families) long after they have returned home and taken off their uniforms is the truest form of patriotism



is, I believe just as important as those we honor whose names are listed on our Veterans Memorial Wall on the corner of Maple Avenue and Torrance Boulevard, dedicated on March 19, 2005.

We must never forget as we stand in reverence before this monument of marble and stone on Veterans Day all those who went before us and gave their lives and those who served honorably and deserve our upmost respect and gratitude. We have a solemn and sacred responsibility as Americans and citizens of this country to care for our veterans. To care for those who have served, sacrificed, and worn

and love of country. A truly living and caring memorial is helping our veterans that come home wounded physically and emotionally.

We have many veterans in the city of Torrance and I had the honor of visiting with one of them - Gerald (Jerry) Ronan, who served in the United States Navy during WWII. Jerry told me was drafted out of high school at the age of 18, in 1944, and sent into the Navy, along with his high school buddy, Cecil Harris. Cecil was inducted into the army, and was dead six months later in Europe. "We had been altar boys together and gone all through school - a little school

- there were twelve in our graduating class. So that was a real shock. I ended up in the Navy - going Navy base to Navy base, never going to sea."

Maybe because Jerry served his country and had relatives and friends who died in WWII, is why he remains one of the 'movers and shakers' of the Torrance Historical Society dedicated to documenting the names on the City of Torrance Veterans Memorial loosing their contemporaries from WWII. We had already lost them from WWI. We only have one name [on the wall] from WWI, Bert Crossland; the American Legion Post is named for him. The siblings were dying so I thought this is something we should do. It has been a marvelous experience," said Jerry.

Jerry told me that former Mayor Ken Miller, who grew up in Torrance, was interviewed because he went to school with a lot of the

Wall, and writing about each one of them - putting a face to a name. He was inspired to spearhead this project after observing a teacher in South Dakota gather biographies of every deceased veteran in the entire state. Every name represents a person who had a history, and that history should never be forgotten. Jerry was contacted by the person gathering information on Cecil, his childhood friend, for the project in South Dakota. Later, Jerry thought that was a great idea for Torrance. "We have these names on the wall and most people didn't know anything about them, and I could see that we were very fast


WWII veterans whose names are on the wall. He wrote down little remembrances

of each one. After leaving Jerry Ronan's home in downtown Torrance, I decided to ask a Korean War Veteran about his experiences. He told me, "I joined the National Guard to make \$30 a month to have some money. When I first joined, I signed up for three years - I was a ground trooper. I was in the guard nearly three years before I was 'called up' (the 40th Infantry Division of the National Guard was Federalized) in September and everyone in See Veteran's Day, page 11



# Beasts of No Nation- A Gripping, Provocative Look at War and Child Soldiers

Because we don't see films in a vacuum, any story that carries social or political weight requires an extra step of scrutiny. This isn't to dampen the experience, but to verify the authenticity of a cinematic experience. Beasts of No Nation is based on a novel carefully compiling numerous true accounts merged into protagonist, Agu (Abraham Attah), is a boy living with a loving family. As civil war and unrest infiltrate their lives, it isn't long before Agu is separated from his family and driven into a journey of the horrific world of warfare where children fight alongside adults as soldiers. After all he's been through, it isn't hard for the rebel army to persuade him into

the story of a child solider. An element worth dissecting is that this story does not take place in a specific location, instead opting for an unnamed African country. This has two potential effects. On the positive side, it makes the story and experience universal, as similar situations have happened in numerous central and western African countries. On the contrary, by making the setting not a country in particular but a generic "Africa," it continues an unfortunate American way of painting a massive continent with a single brush stroke. For as unique a story as this is, it only furthers the trend in viewing Africa as a broad country instead of a massive continent with numerous truths and stories within. This is a debate I don't know the answer to, whether the universal nature of the story trumps its broad stroke of the continent.

What about the movie itself? The story structure in Beasts is that of Pinocchio or more recently, 12 Years a Slave in terms of an innocuous individual getting swept into something horrific. In the beginning, our actually wanting to be a solider (even though he doesn't have another choice).

At the top of the army is the unnamed Commandant (Idris Elba). You'd expect this character to be a single stroke of evil, but he isn't. He's charismatic, he expresses interest and care in his soldiers, and he gives them a reason to fight. It's even more terrifying that he is impressionable and even affable than if he were a terrorizing menace: in this world, he makes what they are doing seem okay, even though it is as nightmarish as you might anticipate.

In the middle of the film, we see this unsettling balance between the camaraderie and brotherhood of an army, in the backdrop of an absolutely sickeningly war. Much credit is given to the soundtrack, which is one of the best in recent memory. Because this is not a film with a plot or a driving story, but is more of a journey through the madness, it evokes you to think about the story in a larger context. See Film Review, page 11

# Will Football **Ever Come To L.A.?**

The idea of having football here in Los Angeles seems like a pipe-dream. Sure, there has been talk about it, but that talk has gone on for years now and still, nothing has happened. From Los Angeles to Inglewood to Carson and back, different areas of land have been talked about that would serve well in the site for a new NFL stadium. Still, nothing. Last week, though, something happened that may have officially set the idea of football in L.A. in motion. Robert Iger - chairman and chief executive of Disney - has agreed to join in on efforts to bring football back to the Los Angeles metropolitan area and with his support, a move might finally get done once and for all.

At first the Minnesota Vikings were talked about. Then it was the St. Louis Rams. Now, however, with Iger's backing, it looks like the Oakland Raiders and the San Diego Chargers will be coming to Los Angeles to play in the city of Carson. Of course, don't believe that until something legitimate happens. Other plans have come and gone, like Rams owner Stan Kroenke buying out the Hollywood Racetrack to bring the Rams to town. Obviously, that has still yet to happen. This may not ever happen either, but if there's one thing that this world knows about Disney, it's that they're capable of just about anything.

Like the theme park, should the Raiders and Chargers move to Los Angeles, ticket prices will undoubtedly rise. NFL fans here in Los Angeles don't care about that, though. They simply want a team to root for. With Iger's backing, they'll get two. Iger, as CEO of Disney, is currently one of Hollywood's most powerful executives and the clout that he brings with him could be just enough to make a potential move actually happen. Just recently, in addition to his Disney business, Iger has been named non-executive chairman or Carson Holdings - the joint venture between the two teams that is working with the city of Carson on a project to bring a stadium to the city. With Iger now a part of Carson Holdings, sponsors should be lining up at the door to take part in a venture that would bring the NFL to America's second largest media market.

L.A. has been without a team since 1995 when the Rams left Anaheim for St. Louis and the Raiders left Los Angeles to return back to Oakland. With Kroenke still proposing a plan to build a stadium in Inglewood, and Iger now a part of the proposals for the city of Carson, it's certainly not long before something - anything - gets done. Like Kroenke and his Rams, the Chargers and the Raiders are now solely seeking to gain support for their stadium plan from the NFL owners. "Should the owners approve the move, Los Angeles will proudly welcome two incredible teams to our community and build a stadium worthy of their fans," Iger stated. With the backing of the owners, any plan will instantly become a green light.

One must think that Iger involving himself in such a venture would mean that he has some word that his inclusion will certainly push a plan for a stadium and the relocation of the two teams over the edge. The only thing that could be better than living off of Disney money for the rest of your life would be to own a stake in not one, but two NFL franchises. "This is a major deal that Iger is a primary stakeholder," explained David Carter, executive director of the Sports Business Institute at the USC Marshall School of Business. "Iger would not have agreed to do this if he didn't think his involvement could help drag the proposal over the finish line." Now, a competition seems to have arisen. Would the owners rather back a billionaire like Kroenke and welcome the Rams, or have Iger, who earned 46.5 million in 2014 alone, bring the Raiders and Chargers to town.

How can you say no to a guy who acquired Pixar Animation Studios, Marvel Entertainment and Lucasfilm all in his tenure as CEO of Disney? Disney already owns ESPN, which has a \$1.9-billion annual contract with the NFL for Monday Night Football. All that being said, Iger seems to have the inside track. Who knows, maybe if the Oakland Raiders attach their name and their brand to Disney, the team's current classification as a ruckus team with rowdy and even sometimes violent fans would then change for the better. Everything becomes a little bit happier and nicer when Mickey Mouse is attached to it.

The wait certainly isn't over by any stretch of the imagination, but Angelinos can certainly rest easy knowing that both the NFL and toptier executives from around the world now see Los Angeles as a gold-mine for an NFL team. It's been 20 years since the city of Los Angeles has been able to call a football team its own. While it may be another few until an actual stadium is constructed, both the Raiders and the Chargers could conceivably move to L.A. and be playing in front of home crowds as early as next year. Though everything still seems so far away, the owners decision on a destination for a team will set in place an avalanche of movement that will have the NFL back in Los Angeles in no time. Fans have been patient enough. Now, with Iger's involvement, it's time to let the games begin. •

# <u>Up and Adam</u> **Saxons Shine in Playoff Debut**

If there was any doubt remaining about how ready the North High Saxons are for the playoffs, they've erased it all. After finishing the regular season with a disappointing loss to South High, head coach Todd Croce, linebacker Mique Juarez, and the rest of the Saxons were chomping at the bit to take the field again and prove that they were a dynamic football team. Last Friday night at North High, the Saxons made the word dynamic look like an understatement. Behind excellent play from Juarez and an extremely strong defense, the Saxons jumped out to an early lead and never looked back. With a 48-14 rout of Agoura in the first round of this year's CIF Southern Section Western Division playoffs, the Saxons had no problem earning a date with Mira Costa in the second round.

Almost before the game even got started, Juarez started his scoring. Three minutes in, he took the ball from 23-yards out and got into the end zone for the first points of the contest. Neither Juarez nor the Saxons looked back from there. "The key tonight was us playing together as a team," Juarez said. "We did everything we were supposed to do and we executed. Not only on offense, either. The North High defense forced three first quarter fumbles, two of which led to Juarez touchdowns. By the end of the first quarter North held a 20-point lead. By halftime, the lead ballooned to 34.

"We came out with high energy," coach Croce said. "Overall our defense was solid tonight." Not just solid, but excellent. Agoura (1-10, 1-2) was held without a first down in the game until just two minutes remained in the first half. They would eventually put up one score in the first half and one to begin the second, but aside from those 14 points, North would hold them in check for the remainder of the night. Juarez finished the day throwing for 115 yards and one touchdown to his favorite receiver, Justin Allmond. He also ran for 150 yards on 13 carries for five more touchdowns to bring his TD total to six in the 34-point win.

The win means that the Saxons (9-2, 4-1) will move on to play Mira Costa (9-2, 3-2) - a team that they have not traditionally had much success against. The Mustangs, in fact, have won the last four matchups between the two teams. "Mira Costa is a solid football team," coach Croce commented. "They are as well coached as anybody and they are going to know their stuff and play well at home. It's going to be a big challenge for us." Keep it tuned in right here to see if Juarez and the rest of the Saxons are up to the task of taking

on a strong, Bay League opponent who beat Ventura 34-24 in their first round matchup. The game will be played this Friday night at 7:30pm.

### West High

The West High Warriors would have asked for any other matchup but the one they got with the Redondo Beach Sea Hawks last Friday night at Redondo High. Not only do Pioneer League teams traditionally not do well versus Bay League teams, but the Warriors also had lost to Redondo 14-3 earlier in the year and have a 4-9 overall record against the Sea Hawks in their last 13 games. Tides didn't change much for the Warriors last week. The game was a tale of two halves of football, but in the end, Redondo put together the more complete game. With 35-28 victory, the Sea Hawks kept their streak against West High alive and bounced the Warriors out of the playoffs in the first round.

Things looked a bit murky for the Warriors as the game got started. Right out of the gate, Redondo's Jermar Jefferson ran the ball 80-yards for a touchdown to put the Warriors in an early hole. Greg Holt and his team would respond. Two consecutive touchdowns by starting quarterback Drake Peabody followed by an interception returned for a touchdown by Denver Silverlake accounted for three straight touchdowns for the Warriors to put them up 21-7 in the second quarter. Things were looking good for West. Momentum changed, however, as Redondo put a touchdown on the board just before the half. A 5-yard pass pulled the Sea Hawks to within seven points at 21-14. "That touchdown made a big difference," coach Holt explained. "If we go into halftime up 21-7, it could be different."

Instead, Redondo took to the ground in the second half and ran the Warriors right out of the stadium. The Sea Hawks ran the ball 10 straight times in the fourth quarter, tiring out West's defense. A 20-yard gain by Malik Spencer that dragged Warriors defenders with him followed by a 2-yard touchdown plunge gave Redondo a 28-21 lead with under two minutes remaining. A pair of turnovers by Peabody led to another Sea Hawks touchdown, eventually putting the game out of reach for good. West fought until the end, but ultimately ran out of steam, taking the seven-point loss.

Peabody went 8-for-18 through the air on the night for 82 yards, one touchdown, and one interception. He also ran for 80 yards and two touchdowns on 16 carries. The loss ends a season that was up and down for the Warriors. Winners of their first two games, West went on to lose four of their next five.

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
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# Sausage, Tomato & Goat Cheese Tarts

# Ingredients

- 1 sheet puff pastry dough, thawed
- 4 oz. Stella goat cheese
- 1 small tomato, sliced
- 3/4 cup cooked, ground Italian sausage
- 1/2 cup grated Stella parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup fresh basil, chopped
- salt and pepper to taste

# Preparation

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 F. Unwrap puff pastry sheet and roll out so it is smooth.
- **2.** Using a knife, cut puff pastry into 6 equal size squares. Use a small glass to score a circle in the center of each square. This will cause the outside edges to puff up around the center filling.
- **3.** Place one tomato slice, some crumbled goat cheese and sausage in the center of each square.
- **4.** Sprinkle each square with parmesan cheese and top with chopped basil. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- 5. Bake for 20 minutes or until golden brown.



"We are doing *Oliver! The Musical* in the James Armstrong Theatre. It is a wonderful play and has been around for a long while. It has great music and is a great opportunity for our youth to perform, and our director thought it would be a good production. Larry

"This is a prevention program so it's not so much reactive like some of our other programs are, but this will help to identify students that may have an issue or that may need some assistance," Dr. Dugal said. "Students can attend with parents' permission and this is on our campuses rather than students having to go somewhere else.

CHOICE activities will be scheduled to take place after school at the participating middle and high schools. The program is designed for both students who do not use alcohol and other drugs and students who may be beginning to experiment.

"As such, CHOICE can be used as both prevention and intervention," states the agenda item. "Sessions are conducted by Prevention Coordinators and Outreach Specialists and funded by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, Substance Abuse Prevention and Control. Students must get parent(s) and/or guardian(s) permission to participate."

While Jostens helps parents and students by making the ordering, sizing, delivery and collection of ceremony apparel process a lot easier, School Board Member Michael Wermers asked that one part of the Jostens' business plan be clearly explained to parents. The company will refund parents with a \$20 check for all gowns sent back to the company [from the high schools]. However, Jostens then bills the district for that check that was reimbursed to the parents.

"Most people, I don't think, have the desire to stick the bill to the district," said Wermers. "I am baffled. Until the last time this gown issue came up at the middle schools, I was not aware this worked that way."

Dr. Dugal, who has met with the Jostens representatives, shared that there is an effort between Jostens representatives and the four high schools and the middle schools to work closer on improving communication, especially as the spring approaches and the schools begin preparing promotion season. "The messaging will be the same at all four high schools in terms of what a loner gown is, [what it entails] if you are buying and keeping your gown, what that includes and what the different packages are," Dr. Dugal said. "The activities directors are also putting the message across as how the process works in terms of the refunds. The refunds are not coming from the district, they are coming from Jostens and Jostens will then bill the district for the number of returned gowns." •

my unit was extended for another year, (by President Truman), beyond their anniversary date. At that point, we became part of the regular army." Immediately, 'basic training refreshing' was held at Camp Cook in Lompoc. By December, he was selected out of his group, and flown from Los Angeles to Columbus, Georgia (Fort Benning) for a nine-week radio repair course specializing in the type of radios used at that time. He said, "After nine weeks, the course was extended to eighteen weeks, so in the end, we were categorized as full-fledged electronics technicians. Then I got sent back to Camp Cook, (Vandenberg Air Force Base) and learned my unit had been shipped overseas to Sendai in northern Japan." The Korean War Veteran then told me that his beautiful young wife, and a friend, Donna Wegnes, (whose husband was already in the service) drove him to San Francisco where his ship was docked. He added, "I had to take a separate troop ship from San Francisco to Japan, which took fourteen days." At this point I asked him what were the conditions on the ship and he told me, "Well, for sleeping quarters, we were stacked four hammocks deep - and it was so hot down there that we would sneak up on deck to cool off under the life boats of the troop ship. I recall singing songs with my buddy." I asked what songs they sang and he said, "Oh, just westerns that we knew at the time." Half jokingly, I asked if it was anything like a cruise - and he laughed and said, "You've got to be kidding."

Then the ship arrived in Yokohama, Japan. He said, "One of the things that impressed me when I got there was, from the ship, and when I got on the train to go north to Sendai, where my unit was located, - was that all the buildings in the harbor of Yokohama were riddled with bullet holes. You could see the bullet holes all over where our dive bombers attacked Yokohama Bay during WWII." The Korean War Veteran was then put on a bullet train toward Northern Japan, and when he finally arrived, his fellow troops were leaving in two days headed to an army base in Southern Japan for permanent quarters. He had one or two days to learn how to climb the rope ladders that were hang over troop ships, carrying his heavy backpack, and rifle - not an easy task. The Veteran then said, "This was on the sea of Japan. The ship took a week to get down to Southern Japan. I stayed there about three weeks and I was given notice that I had finished my one-year extension and they wanted to ship me home. So I had the option of shipping home or

adopt an ordinance to amend the rules and regulations regarding the city's farmers' market was approved by the city council during Tuesday night's city council meeting.

The approved changes include the creation f an Expressive Conduct Users Zone, which would be an area in the middle of the market that will accommodate three individuals or groups. "Every month, applications for the Tuesday and Saturday market expressive conduct users' zone will be received stamped," states the staff report. "The applicants will be scheduled for the following month on a first-come, firstserve basis. No one will be assigned more than two markets per month, and applicants must reapply for subsequent months."

signing up for another year. I thought about a millisecond and selected, I am taking my discharge and going."

He then took another train from his camp to Tokyo where he spent two to three weeks. At this point in the interview, the veteran's wife said, "Yes, and he bought me a silk pillowcase." I looked at the veteran and said, "You bought your young wife a pillowcase?" He laughed and said, "I was not very good about writing [either] - because I was...I was 20 years old." "He has made up for it [buying gifts for her] since," said his wife. "I do recall going to a department store in Tokyo with one or two of the guys. My job while waiting, was working at Camp Drake, outside Tokyo, where I helped with the soldiers coming back from Korea on R & R, taking their equipment, etc. I did that for two or three weeks until my orders came in to ship out of Tokyo, home. It took ten days by ship to Seattle and from there I was bussed to Fort Lewis, Washington. I was discharged and then bussed back home to Los Angeles. I was honorably discharged as a Corporal in the United States Army. My specialty was listed as 'radio electronics repairman'. I repaired walkie-talkies, and other radios used in Korea. I have the Official DD214 separation papers," added the veteran proudly.

Then, I asked this very special Korean War Veteran what he thought about Veteran's Day and he said, "I hear stories about the government not treating the veterans very nicely and I am appalled about that, and that ought to be fixed. I have some friends that are veterans and use the veteran's facility, and some of it is good, [the care] and some of it is not so good. At any rate, we need to be more compassionate to veterans - because when they sign up - they know they could get killed. It is that simple. You sign up and just as well say, you are putting your life on the line, and you could certainly be killed, and that is what happened to hundreds and thousands of people in Korea. We ought to honor those folks. And I have been to the Korean War Memorial in Washington DC and it is very heartwarming. It is very moving."

My daddy, Thomas Lancaster, told this story to me. He is a proud Korean War Veteran who honors those who served before him, and after him, and knows, as all veterans do, the price of service. Abraham Lincoln's quote is still relevant today. We need to care for those who serve. May I suggest you take time to hear a veteran's story this year and thank them. Remember them. Happy Veterans Day to all veterans! •

groups, political outreach and campaigning can take place, within specific rules and codes of conduct that have been developed.

"Over the years, the Torrance Certified Farmers' Market has grown significantly, both in terms of vendors and customers." states the staff report. "Currently there are a total of 112 sellers; 61 farmers and 51 'non-agricultural' vendors who primarily sell food items such as bread, pastries, fish, and olives." In addition, the ordinance established penalties for any violations by vendors or members of the public. However, to date staff has not been forced to penalize anyone for any type of violation to the farmers' market rules. Nor has the Torrance Police Department been required to remove "unruly patrons" or have to cite anyone for legal violations. •
